"In the Days of Herod the King"

Matthew's version of the Christmas story begins this way, "Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the King." Herod is the bad guy in the Christmas story. Who was this King Herod? Why is he important to the Christmas story?

In light of all this, how do I worship fully, like the Magi?

- 1. To worship fully is to search for and pursue (2:1-8)
- 2. To worship fully is to take the risk to go public (2:1-4)
- 3. To worship fully is to genuinely express joy and humility (2:10-11)
- 4. To worship fully is to sacrificially give (2:11)
- 5. To worship fully is to obey (2:12)

confront me, with me!
